1	A member of the school community displays symptoms	Staff, pupils and their families	 If displaying COVID-19 symptoms, a PCR test should be ordered (until 31st March 2022, as free testing ends on 1st April 2022). You should remain at home and avoid contact with other people while you are waiting for the test result. Although the legal requirement to isolate is ending, adults and children who test positive will continue to be advised to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for at least 5 full days and then continue to follow the guidance until they have received two negative test results on consecutive days. 			0	Although there is no legal requirement for staff to inform their employer if they test positive, all staff should follow the school sickness and absence policy. As per operational guidance, if a parent or carer insists on a pupil attending our school where they have a confirmed or suspected case of COVID-19, you can take the decision to refuse the pupil if, in our reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other pupils and staff from possible infection with COVID-19.	
2	Spread of germs including COVID-19	Staff, pupils and their families		Contacts are no longer required to self-isolate or advised to take daily tests, and routine contact tracing has ended. Staff and children who are contacts should attend school as usual. This includes staff who have been in close contact within their household, unless they are able to work from home. The legal requirement has been removed for close contacts who are not fully vaccinated to self-isolate. Classrooms should be well ventilated with open doors (where safe, bearing in mind fire safety and safeguarding) and windows. When the room is occupied the main source of ventilation should be open windows (or an outside door), with outer doors left open when the classroom is empty to further refresh the air. This is to maintain ventilation but try to prevent the room becoming too cold. CO2 monitors used in the classrooms to monitor the quality of ventilation. Windows and doors will be opened/closed to try to balance the temperature of the room and the ventilation. 'Catch it, bin it, kill it' approach to be used. All pupils need easy access to tissues and bins. Hands to be sanitised after sneezing or coughing. Hand sanitiser available in all rooms and children to use it on entering and exiting each room. Windows in the hall will be open during the day to ensure ventilation. There won't be 'bubbles' in operation. If, in our expert view, we are facing severe operational disruption to face-to-face education we will seek public health advice. For example A higher than previously experienced and/or rapidly increasing number of staff or pupil absences due to COVID-19 infection Evidence of severe disease due to COVID-19, for example if a pupil or staff member is admitted to hospital due to COVID-19 A cluster of cases where there are concerns about the health and needs of vulnerable staff or student within the affected group. Suffolk County Council expect this to be an exceptional occurrence as evidence should be that the impact of COVID-19 is under control.
